### **REPORT**

The council has agreed to plant saplings to restore the northern headline on Westcroft green.

The Woodland Trust is currently offering tree and hedging packs for communities to be delivered in March.

Three 'small hedge packs' have been offered to restore the wildlife corridor equating to 18-24m of double row hedging:





# Hedge

Make a natural screen or connect existing woodland to help wildlife stay on the move. You will get a variety of each species for 8 metres of full, easy to manage hedging.

For a longer length, our Wild Harvest, Year Round Colour, Wildlife, and Wild Wood packs also make great hedgerows and are available with 105 or 420 saplings.

- Trees: 30
- Species: dog rose, hawthorn, hazel, crab apple, dogwood
- Size of land: 6-8 metres of double-row hedging

This is in-line with a number of council objectives and an agreed council project.
