Saxilby School Children's Queen's Jubilee Mosaic Materials

- Retain and encourage employment and tourism opportunities

Under the Equality Act 2010, the council must have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity, and foster good relations.

- The project preserves artwork created by local schoolchildren, strengthening community and intergenerational cohesion.

- Inviting material donations locally reduces carbon associated with the transportation of new products.
- Construction activity is local and small-scale; any associated carbon footprint will be minimal.
- Digital communication methods will be used as far as practical to reduce printing.

I. Purpose of the Report

To seek council approval to publicly request donations of materials and to launch a community crowdfunder to fund the mosaic materials required for the Mosaic Re-installation Project.

2. Background

The mosaic tiles for this project were originally created by local schoolchildren at Saxilby C of E Primary School for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012. The tiles were installed on the concrete flood wall on Bridge Street within the village; however, over time the bond deteriorated, and tiles progressively fell away.

To preserve the artwork and secure a long-term home, for this emotive project, alternative sites were reviewed. Lincolnshire Co-op agreed to host the mosaic on a purpose-built plinth at their site, subject to the parish council signing the Mosaic Plinth Licence.

A local builder has offered to undertake the project to build the plinth, now materials need to be secured for the materials necessary to complete the installation.

Previous considerations noted by Council:

- The mosaic plinth will need to be added to the parish council's asset register and insured.
- An unveiling event will be arranged in due course by the events team.
- LT has contacted the college regarding potential student involvement.

Progress to date:

- Builders' merchants have been approached for material donations, but no offers have been received.
- Without materials, the builder cannot construct the base for the plinth.
- A community appeal is now required to secure material donations or funds to purchase them so the project can progress.

3. Financial Considerations

- No allocated funds are currently available for this project; an alternative approach is required.
- Community donations in-kind reduce the level of financial contribution required.
- A crowdfunder provides a transparent, low-risk method to raise funds solely for the purchase of materials.

4. Wish list: A list of materials needed

- ☑ Standard engineering charcoal grey bricks 100 (for 2 band courses at ground level)
- ☑ Engineering charcoal grey bullnose bricks minimum 124 (for the mosaic perimeter)
- ☑ Engineering charcoal grey bullnose corner bricks minimum 4
- ☑ Reclaimed bricks 516 (equivalent to 8.6m² at 60/m²)
- ☑ Backing & below-ground Class A blocks minimum 120

RECOMMENDATION(S):

- 1. Comms share a public request for community donations of mosaic and construction materials open for one month and share any offers received with the Administration Team.
- 2. Events group support the project by liaising with comms to share the request with local residents, groups, and contacts and arrange the unveiling celebration in due course.
- 3. Launch a crowdfunder to raise funds for materials if in-kind donations have not been secured after the one-month period.
