

Pavilion Bar Consultation Report



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Executive Summary

This report explores and presents the results of the comprehensive Big Community Survey, that was developed to ask residents for their views on the services that the Council provides to inform the delivery of Council services going forwards.

A total of 1090 valid consultation responses were made, with a total of 13 invalid surveys being removed from the data set as a result of the data checking.

Respondents were asked whether they supported the current Council objectives which were based on the public consultation undertaken for the Saxilby with Ingleby Neighbourhood Development Plan. Overall, there was strong support for the Council's current objectives.

Grounds maintenance was strongly supported in the survey with bin emptying, litter picking, the provision of bins/dog waste bins, grass cutting, and the maintenance of trees being most highly rated. The provision of benches and bus shelters was not felt to be as important.

Residents supported the idea of the Community Centre being a Community Hub, with room hire and library provision. Around six in ten respondents felt the provision of changing rooms and the Pavilion Bar was important or very important.

There was a preference for a family friendly bar, with opening hours of weekday afternoons, evenings, and weekends, which would be a reduction of the previous opening hours and for the library opening hours to be 12-15 hours per week, again a reduction from the current provision in opening hours.

The event that respondents felt was most important was the 'Christmas lights switch on and fireworks display' where 84% selected that it was very/important.

These results will be considered by the Council and assist in determining the way forward for the services provided by the Council.

Background

Due to the restrictions imposed on access to indoor spaces during the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020/21 and the serious fire at the Community Centre in May 2020, the Community Centre was closed for the majority of the financial year. The building was handed back from the fire restoration contractors in January 2021.

The Council has a duty to spend public money responsibly – undertaking effective financial management, and to identify, assess and manage risks¹. As a result, the Council agreed a 'no income' budget for 2021/22; Income that was not guaranteed, or was uncertain, was not included within the budget.

At the July 2019 Full Council Meeting (agenda item 16 - Community Centre Strategy Options Paper) it was agreed that residents would be asked for their views on how they wanted to see their Community Centre and whether they would like to see the continued provision of a bar at the St Andrews Community Centre. The results showed that 60% would like to see the continued provision of the Pavilion bar. The Council therefore agreed to look at outsourcing the bar, with all options for this being open from commercial operation to community led. This second, more detailed consultation, was undertaken in July 2021 based on a template survey from the Plunkett Foundation.

Introduction

This report shares the results of a survey on the Pavilion Bar to find out what residents and users would like the bar to provide and whether they would be interested in becoming involved in a community led enterprise.

Undertaking the survey is a requirement of accessing support from the Plunkett Foundation if the Council proceeds down a community led route for the provision of a bar.

Methodology

The survey was based on the Plunkett Foundation's community pub questionnaire template (see Appendix 2, for a blank version).

The survey was available to complete online on Survey Monkey, with access being available via Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter. A paper survey was also included in the parish magazine, the Foss Focus.

A total of 210 valid consultation responses were made.

The consultation period ran from 5 July 2021 to 31 July 2021.

1. Online


206 completed online surveys were received on the Survey Monkey platform.

The social media promotion had a total reach of over 9,611 with 15 posts promoting the survey across Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter.

2. Foss Focus

The survey was printed in the parish magazine (Foss Focus, July 2021 edition) which has a circulation of around 1,000 households. A total of 4 completed paper surveys were received.

Data Checking

Following the closing date and the paper survey data being input, data checking took place to ensure the accuracy of data and to identify any duplicate entries. Submissions were checked including where more than one survey was submitted from the same IP address. No surveys were removed from the data set as a result of the data checking.

Household Profile

Respondents were asked how many people there were in each age range there are in your household. The results are shown below:

WOULD YOU USE THE PAVILION BAR?

If the Pavilion Bar was run by the community in Saxilby would you, or any member of your household use it?

65% of respondents stated they would use the bar on a weekly basis ranging from to once a week (31%), to 2-3 times a week (29%), to Daily (4%)². Under one tenth of respondents noted they would not use the facility at all (9%).



ADDITIONAL SERVICES

What additional services would you be most like to see the pub offer?

The community was interested in the bar providing a variety of additional services. The most frequent response was a family friendly area (68%, 136n). This is in-line with the results of the Big Community Survey where there was a strong preference for a family friendly bar (71%). Over 50% of respondents would also like to see live music, catering, and big screen sports.

There was less support for a function room or games room, however there are already function rooms available on-site and the provision of these for community use had strong support in the Big Community Survey (77%). It may therefore be that respondents felt a function room was not required as part of the Pavilion Bar offer as it is provided elsewhere within the community centre.

ADDITIONAL SERVICES

Are there any community services you would like to see on offer at the pub? For example, pop-up health services etc?

A variety of themes came across when respondents were asked if they would like to see the

bar provide any other services. These included:

- Health, information, and support services with families, children and young people, and older people all being groups that were mentioned
- Provision/hosting of clubs, events, and entertainment
- Access to sport and exercise opportunities
- Access to education and the library
- Being family focused

A full list of the responses is available in Appendix 1.

CATERING

What kind of catering would you like to see from the pub?

Just over four in ten respondents noted they would like catering to be available at Sunday lunchtime. Around a third of respondents selected weekday lunch, weekday dinner, Saturday lunch, and Saturday dinner.

A third of respondents (33%) stated the provision of food was not important.

Based on the results below there did not appear to be a strong appetite for the provision of meals at the venue, but rather snacks and light bites (as shown in the comments provided below)




Fig 3. Catering at the Pavilion bar?

Where residents ticked 'other' they were asked to provide further information. The clear picture that came back was most respondents were favouring a snack/light bites menu. The responses are shown below:

- Snacks x 9
- Snack food. Sandwiches. Sausage rolls.
- If they are going to do food or would just need to be a basic pub menu, the Sun [Inn] is going to start doing food soon so I don't think it would be feasible
- Snacks and drinks/ice cream for park users
- Cakes, biscuits, fruit. Soft drinks, coffees etc
- Basket bar meals i.e. chicken and chips, scampi and chips, burgers, hotdogs, chips and cheese. Filled rolls. Would only

do this though on a Friday teatime 4-8 and a sat 2-8 and then on a Sunday 2-6. Mainly for when the big sporting events are on tv/Sky. That's if you have Sky back. Personally, I think it's a must as it always brings so much custom through the doors. Would also think about maybe hiring the kitchen out separately.

- Think quick things to feed children like cones of chips/chip buttys low-cost things which are easy to staff
- Meals and snacks most days
- Sandwich, cake, sausage roll, veggie option.
- Snacks and cakes i.e. light bites
- Friday evening, Sunday evening
- Light snacks available at all times

- Pub snacks sandwiches
- light bite menu breakfast, lunch & evening.
- Just a cafe type no alcohol
- Would use them any time of week if serving nice food
- Snacks i.e. sandwiches, cakes etc to supply football supporters, mums at play park etc
- Hot snacks
- Vegetarian food
- Although the idea of food provision is nice, I can't see that it would be profitable
- Theme nights
- Breakfasts
- Food available as much as possible

IMPORTANCE OF A COMMUNITY BAR

On a scale of 1 - 5 (where 1 is not important and 5 is very important), how important do you think it is to have the Pavilion Bar in Saxilby?

83% of respondents felt it was important for the village to have the bar. Some caution is advised when considering this figure, as those completing survey on this topic, may be more likely to want to keep the bar to be open.

However, on the recent Big Community Survey 60% of respondents noted they felt it was important or very important to have the Pavilion bar, so there is a majority community appetite for the continued provision of the bar.




Fig 4. How important or not is having the Pavilion bar?

A number of respondents indicated they would be interested in helping a co-operative pub in different ways. These are shown below:




Fig 5. Would you be interested in helping a co-operative pub project?

ANY FURTHER COMMENTS, SUGGESTIONS OR IDEAS

Some respondents made further comments they are provided below:

- The Pavilion should be self-funded by its customers and not propped up via money from the Parish Council. Do the other pubs in the village get this monetary assistance? If it cannot break even or make a profit, it would suggest that it is not a facility for the whole community, but for a few
- Personally, I would sooner any parish council money was put to improving and increasing the number of footpaths around the village to improve people fitness and well-being
- Could the Sun be asked if they would want to run bar for functions? And a cafe be run by community?
- Just get it up and running again for the better of the community you will see the benefits financially
- Sorry disappointed with parish council

CONCLUSION

This report presents and considers the results Pavilion Bar Survey. It is recommended that the results are used to inform the outsourcing of the Pavilion Bar. outsourcing.
