GATHERING

10.45am all gather in silence

The Leader: Welcomes everyone and introduces the service, noting the public responses are printed in Blue.

Leader reads:

God is our refuge and strength;
a very present help in trouble. Psalm 46.1

Leader continues:

We meet in the presence of God.

We commit ourselves to work in penitence and faith for reconciliation between the nations, that all people may, together, live in freedom, justice, and peace.

We pray for all who in bereavement, disability and pain continue to suffer the consequences of fighting and terror. We remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away.

REMEMBERING

The Names of those being commemorated are read out.

The leader reads the WWI names and Neil Mellor the WWII names.

The names of the fallen are printed on the last page.

Neil Mellor says...

They shall grow not old,
as we that are left grow old;
age shall not weary them,
nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun
and in the morning,
we will remember them.

All respond - We will remember them.

Bugler plays the Last Post. The beginning of the two-minute silence, Neil Mellor lowers the flag.

Silence (Cllr J Willox indicates when two minutes has passed.)

Bugler plays Reveille. Neil Mellor raises the Scout and Guide Standards.

Neil Mellor reads The Kohima Epitaph

When you go home
tell them of us and say,
for your tomorrow
we gave our today.

The leader reads the prayer:

Ever-living God we remember those whom you have gathered from the storm of war into the peace of your presence; may that same peace calm our fears, bring justice to all peoples and establish harmony among the nations, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Leader:

Hear these words from the New Testament

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. John 14:27

The wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace. James 3:17-18

This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. 1 John 1:5

The leader reads the prayers:

Let us pray for all who suffer as a result of conflict, and ask that God may give us peace:

for the service men and women who have

died in the violence of war, each one

remembered by and known to God;

May God give peace: **God give peace**

for those who love them in death as in life,

offering the distress of our grief and the

sadness of our loss;

May God give peace: **God give peace**

for all members of the armed forces who

are in danger this day, remembering

family, friends and all who pray for their

safe return;

May God give peace: **God give peace**

for civilian women, children, and men

whose lives are disfigured by war or terror,

calling to mind in penitence the anger and

hatreds of humanity;

May God give peace: **God give peace**

for peace-makers and peace-keepers, who

seek to keep this world secure and free;

May God give peace: **God give peace**

for all who bear the burden and privilege

of leadership, political, military and

religious; asking for gifts of wisdom and

resolve in the search for reconciliation and peace.

May God give peace: **God give peace**

O God of truth and justice,

we hold before you those whose memory we cherish,

and those whose names we will never know.

Help us to lift our eyes above the torment of this broken world,

and grant us the grace to pray for those who wish us harm.

As we honour the past, may we put our faith in your future;

for you are the source of life and hope, now and for ever.

Amen.

The leader introduces the Lord's Prayer (which we say together)

Our Father, who art in heaven,

hallowed be thy name.
Thy Kingdom come;
thy will be done on earth
as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread
and forgive us our trespasses
as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation
but deliver us from evil
For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory
for ever and ever. Amen
